When faced with a crisis like COVID-19, we can let it paralyze us... or we can grasp the opportunity to make lifesaving change. With your help, Alley Cat Allies has a long history of finding innovative new ways forward in the face of tough situations.

It seems hard to believe, but back in 1990, our president and founder Becky Robinson couldn't find a single veterinarian to neuter a community cat in the greater Washington, D.C., area. There were no nonlethal options for cats living outdoors; no blueprint to protect them. The majority of cats, even socialized and adoptable cats, were killed in shelters.

So, Becky formed Alley Cat Allies, and we made our

1996, for 24 years, Giblin has donated regularly to protect cats and kittens—who have always been important to her.

"Cats are my first love," she says. That is why Giblin chose to name Alley Cat Allies in her will. She has spent all her life helping cats, so it was an easy decision to ensure her legacy will do the same.

Giblin isn't afraid to get hands on for the cats who need her, either. She learned on her own how to bottle-feed and raise her now 12-year-old cat, Figaro, when he was just 3 weeks old and found without his mother.

And when asked why she gives to Alley Cat Allies, she recalls one of her most beloved cats.

"When I think of Alley Cat Allies, I think of Beauty, a cat who was with me for almost 20 years," Giblin explains. "Beauty reminds me how special our bond is with cats. That they are important and deserve to be protected."

### 20 YEARS OF THE BOARDWALK CATS PROJECT®

Smokey, the matriarch of the cat families living along the Atlantic City Boardwalk in New Jersey, is still spry at the ripe old age of 20. She explores the sprawling hidden space beneath the Boardwalk, cuddles each member of her feline family, and enjoys regular meals from her caregiver.

But 20 years ago, Smokey's life almost took a very different turn. If not for Alley Cat Allies' Boardwalk Cats Project, she may have spent her last days as a young kitten in an animal shelter.

In 2000, Alley Cat Allies was contacted by Atlantic City caregivers who needed help to defend their community cats. One female cat had already been trapped and killed at the local shelter. Her unweaned kittens were left to die.

Alley Cat Allies took a stand to raise the voices of these dedicated caregivers and protect Smokey

and all the cats living under the famous two-mile-long Boardwalk.

By mobilizing the Atlantic City community and supporters like you, we inspired the city public health department to embrace the humane and effective approach of Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR). We named our initiative the Boardwalk Cats Project and formed a coalition that includes the Humane Society of Atlantic County and the devoted caregivers. Together, we transformed Atlantic City policies to save all the Boardwalk cats and kittens.

This year, on its 20th anniversary, our Boardwalk Cats Project remains a model for coexistence between cats and people in every community. There's plenty of reason to celebrate, so we're planning something special. Stay tuned for more details at **alleycat.org/BoardwalkCats**.

To get food to the largest number of animals in need, we began working with community food banks that



primarily distribute food for people. So far, we have donated animal food to Feeding Florida, a statewide network of food banks, as well as Collier County Emergency Management, and other food banks across the nation.

Alley Cat Allies is also donating dog food through our Keeping Families Together campaign! This Florida man came to a public distribution event to receive no-cost meals for his beloved dog, also pictured.

In the process, we helped create a model in which community food banks expand their mission and

recognize the importance of providing food for our animal family members and community cats.

Through Keeping Families Together<sup>™</sup>, we also issued emergency funds to more than 50 organizations around the country. One such organization, Friends For Life in Houston, has been holding Community Outreach Clinics, all with safe social distancing, to provide treatment, microchipping, and vaccinations for thousands of animals.

Leave Them Be<sup>™</sup>, our other new campaign, launched as the COVID-19 crisis slowed spay and neuter across the nation for months—right as kitten season ramped up. Leave Them Be is educating people that the best way to save young kittens' lives is to leave them with their mother, who is their best caregiver.

In line with Leave Them Be, FieldHaven Feline Center in California utilized our emergency grant to launch its "Kitten Sitter" program. The program educates and provides tools to community members to watch over young kittens outdoors rather than separating them from their mothers.

# **ALLEY CAT ALLIES IN THE NEWS**

As the pandemic led to so many questions about cats, we protected them by sharing critical expertise through leading news outlets. Our president and founder, Becky Robinson, was quoted in the **New York Times** with advice for those who adopted animals during the shutdown. The nationally syndicated column **My Pet World** passed along Becky's guidance that "Stay at Home" orders did not restrict people from caring for community cats. # **SAVING LIVES IN CRISIS-TIME KITTEN SEASON**

Usually by this date, thousands of community cats would have been spayed or neutered. But, like with most things in our lives, COVID-19 has uprooted the usual.

Many spay and neuter clinics had to suspend their critical services... right around the time of year most kittens are born. As a result, people are discovering a growing number of kittens outdoors in their neighborhoods.

Alley Cat Allies is leading the way to protect these kittens during this crisis—and always. Here are just some of the kittens' lives we've saved thanks to your support.



#### **Snook Kittens**—Raised the Natural Way

Leave Them Be<sup>™</sup> is the best approach to newborn kittens. The story of the Snook kittens proves it! This litter of five was born to mother cat Sunny in a shed in northern California. FieldHaven Feline Center (see page 5) educated concerned neighbors to simply watch over the entire family and not intervene. Sunny raised her kittens well, and all have been adopted into loving homes. Sunny herself was spayed and returned to her outdoor home, where she is thriving.
