Feline Frenzy brings together local animal protection groups, veterinarians, advocates, caregivers, policymakers, and residents to create lasting change for cats. A big part of kicking off that change are highquality spay and neuter and wellness events-with all costs covered by Alley Cat Allies.

YOUR generosity powers this critical work to save cats and improve communities.

Recently, we held two such events in Wise County, Virginia, and St. Mary's County, Maryland. In just a few days, more than 200 cats and kittens were spayed and neutered, vaccinated, microchipped, eartipped for identification, and returned to their outdoor homes! We also gave out thousands of pounds of cat food to caregivers in the most need.

Serving Chili This Spring

Just as April showers bring May flowers, spring brings a boom in kitten births. So it came as no surprise when our Cat Help Desk fielded a call about a new cat mother-Chili-with a litter of 4 kittens outdoors in California. The caller was concerned about the little family's well-being, and we let her know not to worry! A mother cat is kittens' best caretaker and can keep her babies safe in her outdoor home.

We advised the caller to set up an outdoor shelter—

with straw to give mom and kittens a comfortable home base. And once the kittens are old enough, we'll help ensure they are spayed and neutered!



A KITTEN'S ROAD

Step by wobbly step, tiny neonatal kittens become sleek, spry adult to Cathood

cats. They go through a lot of changes along the way (though sleeping most of the day never changes!). Just in time for spring—and Kitten Season—here are kittens' biggest milestones.

The most kittens are born during the warmest months, AKA Kitten Season.

Newborn

Kittens' eyes are closed, ears are folded, and they can't stand, keep themselves warm, eliminate waste, or eat on their own. They rely on mom for everything!

Kittens' eyes are fully open (they may start opening at 1 week!) and they're taking their first wobbly steps. Kittens this age start interacting more with each other!

Neonatal kittens are those younger than 4 weeks of age. They need round-the-clock care!

4 Weeks

Kittens are sturdy on their feet and playing with each other, toys, and people. They've been introduced to wet food and a litter box at around 3 weeks old.

6 Weeks

Kittens are using the litter box and eating cat food, but still visiting mom for snacks and comfort. Socialization and play are critical at this age!





8 Weeks



Kittens are old enough to be spayed or neutered—as long as they're

VICTORY! Three **Law** and **Policy Wins** for Cats

WEST VIRGINIA

Since our in-depth investigation into Berkeley County Animal Control revealed what we consider shocking animal cruelty, Alley Cat Allies has gone to court to protect the county's cats. In 2021, we filed Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests for public records from the county sheriff's department, including those related to treatment of animals. The department never provided most of that information—which is a violation of FOIA.

We took action, and now a Berkeley County Circuit Court judge has ordered the sheriff's department to finally produce the documents! Soon, Alley Cat Allies and citizens will know what has truly been happening to animals in the shelter—and start down



MAINE

Cats were nearly included in Maine's animal trespass law, meaning animal control officers would be obligated to chase and trap any cat accused of "trespassing" on a property. In other words, many, many more community cats would have been killed in shelters. Alley Cat Allies testified against the bill alongside many other advocates, and the bill failed to pass!





UTAH

Alley Cat Allies testified and rallied advocates in Utah to oppose an absurd bill that would restrict community cat caregivers to only feeding cats during daylight hours. Thanks to our voices together, the Utah House of Representatives defeated the bill, which would have done irreparable harm to TNR in the state.
