Dear Mayor Genrich and council members,

As the City of Green Bay considers future approaches to community cats—unowned cats who live outdoors—Alley Cat Allies is reaching out to advocate for legislation that will allow Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) in the city.

While we understand no formal meetings are currently scheduled on this matter, we believe now is the ideal time to discuss the implementation of a TNR program. It is the only humane and effective approach to community cats. **Furthermore, we offer our expertise and resources in establishing TNR in the City of Green Bay.**

Alley Cat Allies is the leader of the global movement to protect cats and kittens. Through our innovative programs and fearless advocacy, we champion the humane treatment of all cats. We work toward a world where every cat is valued and protected, and every community has policies and programs to defend them.

Founded in 1990, Alley Cat Allies launched TNR into the mainstream in the United States. We regularly work with lawmakers, animal shelters, and the public to change attitudes and advance laws and policies that best serve the interests of cats.

### **Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) Is the Only Humane, Effective Approach**

Through TNR, community cats are humanely trapped; brought to a veterinary clinic to be spayed or neutered, eartipped (the universal sign that a cat has been spayed or neutered through a TNR program), and vaccinated; and then returned to their original outdoor homes.

TNR is proven to stabilize community cat populations by stopping the cycle of reproduction; improve the cats' health and public health through vaccinations; and benefit animal control agencies and shelters by reducing cat intake and calls of concern. Today, communities like the city of La Crosse and others across the country have adopted TNR ordinances or policies, and thousands more worldwide are conducting grassroots, volunteer-led programs.

Recognizing that TNR programs do not always fit squarely within the four corners of existing legal structures, the American Bar Association, the largest association of legal professionals in the United States, took a position in 2017 urging state and local governments to interpret current laws and policies in a way that facilitates TNR. Therefore, it is critical that laws, policies, and interpretations are in place to permit TNR programs.

### **Please Support TNR**

This is the city's chance to implement an ordinance that creates a support network for community cats and ultimately reduce intake of cats by animal control, address community concerns, and save cats' lives.

Alley Cat Allies strongly urges the adoption of a TNR program in Green Bay. We are eager to provide any other information that would be helpful and hope to hear from you soon.
